


REFUGEE HEALTH CUTS FLOWCHART FOR FRONTLINE WORKERS IN ONTARIO

Last update: August 19, 2012 - Created by the No IFH Cuts Coalition including; healthcare, law, shelter and other frontline workers in Ontario



Notes:

- For those with IFH, but no OHIP, in-hospital medications do not appear to be covered. This is explicitly clear for chemotherapy drugs.
- "Public health and public safety" defined as diseases on Public Health Agency of Canada website (e.g. TB, HIV) and conditions where the person is a harm to others as certified by an MD. PHAC website: <http://www.phac-aspc.gc.ca/bid-bmi/dsd-dsm/duns-eng.php>
- The 'Designated Countries of Origin' list has not yet been announced. Until it is, all refugee claimants get the same coverage regardless of country of origin.
- This includes drugs, emergency dental care, basic vision care, prosthetics, assistive devices, access to long term care, counseling, and in some cases, midwives. Ontario midwives can still see patients without OHIP or IFH.
